

## Wood Sourcing Policy Table

In order to stress test the wood sourcing policies of the companies featured in this issue we have developed a scoring mechanism, which is broken down in the table below. Companies were awarded marks out of ten for having critical elements of a robust policy in place.

### Hall of Shame

Also getting a Worst rating on the table, but with a score of 0, are the following companies: Bensons For Beds, BrightHouse, Capital Gardens, Country Homes and Gardens, CSL, DFS, Dreams, Dunelm Mill, The Futon Company, Furniture Village, Garden & Leisure, The Garden Centre Group, Habitat, Heals, Hillier, Homestyle, Klondyke Garden Centres, Laura Ashley, Multyork, The Range, Selfridges, SCS Sofas and Sharps. They all sell wood products but did not reply to Ethical Consumer's request for information and had no publicly available information on their timber sourcing policies on their websites.
